REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Our Chairman's Report

Central and West Integration Network has continued to offer activities aimed at bringing people - individuals, community groups, and other agencies - together. Through all of these we try to ensure that refugees, asylum seekers, migrant workers and BAME communities in Central and West Glasgow have access to resources needed to alleviate poverty, improve living standards and promote settlement and integration within the wider community.

We still have a strong focus on the needs of refugees and asylum seekers, especially at a time when the UK government is trying to make the environment more 'hostile' for them. Refugees and asylum seekers make up many, but by no means all, of the users of our always busy and welcoming Friday 'drop-in' sessions. Everyone enjoys sitting down together for a hot meal at these. A range of support and activity is available there, from the Food Bank to advice, information and language learning, and sometimes entertainment or craft activities as well. We are also happy to act as one of the main places where people collect destitution grants from the Refugee Survival Trust, having helped 512 people this year, a major commitment for our staff.

We also support activities for a wide range of people in the community, for example through ESOL classes and women's activities groups. This happens both in Garnethill Multicultural Community Centre, where we are based, and across the City Centre and West End, from Townhead to Whiteinch. With the help of the National Lottery's Young Start Fund we launched a new programme of youth activities, which have been getting an enthusiastic response from young people.

This was a particularly busy year of special events, in venues from Hillhead Library to Kelvingrove Park. Our members' meetings provided lively opportunities to exchange ideas about the issues facing our communities and actions to deal with these; and our Information Bulletins help to keep members in touch with issues and opportunities.

This is all achieved by a small staff from a rather cramped space! Thanks, must go to Florence, Julia and Wing for their continuing efforts, and to Sylvia who started working during the year. It would not be possible without the active team of volunteers that we support – more than 40 this year, or the support of our Executive Committee members.

Thanks, are also due to all our funders, especially to Glasgow Community Planning Partnership, without whose core financial support we would not exist; and to a range of partners who make our activities possible. I have space to mention only the Refugee Survival Trust, Glasgow ESOL Forum, Garnethill Multicultural Community Centre, and the range of shops, plus the FareShare project, who help us with food.




This will be our last full year of reporting on the Network under its old Constitution. Later in 2018 we completed the process of becoming a Scottish Charitable Incorporated

Trustees Report

Our Mission Statement

We aim to build a network that brings people together, including formal and informal community groups, agencies and individuals, to seek to ensure that all refugees, asylum seekers, migrant workers and BME communities in Central and West Glasgow have full and equal access to resources which assist in alleviating poverty, improving their standard of living and promoting their settlement and integration within the wider community. We shall do so especially by building the strengths of groups within and across communities, and whenever possible by bringing together people from different communities, including the majority community, for common action and activities.

Our Values

In pursuing this mission, we are driven by these values:

- Empowering individuals and groups to influence issues that affect them and their communities
- Supporting people to take part in decision making and to make their own choices in life
- Strengthening race equality and combating racial hatred
- Celebrating cultural difference and also those things that people have in common
- Tackling discrimination in all its forms, including that based on age or disability
- Actively seeking to cooperate with others in order to secure the best possible outcomes for our communities.

Our Objectives

- Build a network that brings together people and groups from migrant and longer established communities
- Promote integration in order to address practical issues facing migrant communities and achieve equal opportunities
- Work with services to remove barriers to access
- Address discrimination between and within communities, including gender, disability etc.
- Build the capacity of groups representing or involving migrant communities
- Provide opportunities for cultural and personal exchanges between communities
- Promote the health and wellbeing of everyone involved, through promoting positive activity, mutual support and access to information and services.



Our Group Work: We continued to run women's group in Townhead Village Hall where we held more than 11 sessions of sessions of varied activities for BME and Asylum Seekers and Refugee women. We also had a community engagement event in Townhead. We also had up to 11 sessions of sewing and crafts workshops for women in The Whiteinch Centre. Our Mothers and Children group continued to run from Garnethill Multicultural Centre with crafts workshops for parents and children working towards the Interfest – a Refugee Festival event and Christmas.

Our ESOL Classes: Our target was to have 3 terms of ESOL courses organised in Garnethill Multicultural Centre, Townhead Village Hall and The Whiteinch Centre by March 2018 with 70 learners attending. 40 volunteers from the target communities trained and supported and engaged within the organisation by March 2018. 50 men, women and children engage in different learning activities by March 2018

CWIN has been able to meet the above target as well as exceeded them. We had more than 150 people attend the ESOL classes from 3 community centres in the North West namely Garnethill Multicultural Centre, The Whiteinch Centre and Townhead Village Hall.

Our Volunteers Development Programme: We were also able to recruit more volunteers during this period as well as build the capacity of this volunteers by organising a number of volunteers development days. During this period of reporting, Central and West integartion Network supported more than 40 volunteers to engage in various aspects of work within the organisation.





Our events: This year we organised event during the Refugee Week titled Interfest. This event was part of Refugee Festival. Other community events we organised were Mental Health Awareness event, 2 Cup of Tea With Refugee events in Kelvingrove Park, Black History Month event, 16 days of action event, Burns event, 3 International Women's Day events in 3 locations, Townhead Community Engagement event, 3 end of year party in 3 locations. We had more than 400 people attending these events.

Our Network Development: We were able to send out more than 45 weekly information news updates to individuals and representatives of voluntary and statutory agencies working with BME, asylum seekers and refugees. Information contained in the news update include funding information, training, conferences, vacancies and other interesting information. We also continued to organise our monthly meetings where we bring together some of the above representatives for information, networking and information sharing. We had upto 8 meetings with up to 10 presentations from different organisations and agencies.

Food Bank, Drop in Service and Destitution Grants: We provided more than 45 sessions of foodbank provision which included a drop-in service with hot food. During of the drop-in days, we provided activities such as film screening, community events, weekly sexual health information and awareness raising, monthly pop up shop by Refuweegee. We also worked in partnership with Refugee Survival Trust to 512 applications for asylum seekers, refugees and other migrants for destitution grants

Our Youth Club: CWIN has been able to offer ongoing weekly after-school classes during term time and separate full-day programmes during holidays. During term time, the youth project has run homework club and cooking class for young people between the ages of 7 and 13 and an arts and crafts workshop for families and children between the ages of 3 and 12. Additionally, CWIN worked in partnership with Toonspeak to offer Shine – a 10-week drama and life coaching course for young people over the age of 14. Young Chefs (cooking) and a Young Entrepreneurs (art and crafts). CWIN Youth Club launched its first Multicultural Mini Café on the 25th March. It was a fundraising and a celebration day for the community. In February 2018 the Youth Club launched photography and creative writing workshops. On the 9th March, Big Idea Co came to deliver a "designing a medal" workshop to the Youth Club in honour of Walter Tull. Young people learned about Tull's story, they designed their own medal while discussing the importance to live in a fairer society. Additionally, young people shared their design and idea with the artist Lynne Maclachlan who designed the final medal

During the summer holidays, CWIN ran The Summer Sessions – a 7-week programme for young people between the ages of 8 to 18. During the October break, they ran a 4-day photography and mapping project called M8SHIP.

We had a total of 155 participants for the Youth Project.



Our City Wide Involvment: Our staff participated in several forums across the city including; Glasgow Integration Forum, Glasgow Asylum and Destitution Action Network, Glasgow Foodbank Forum, on the mailing for the new Woodlands Health Centre Arts and Environment Planning group as well as violence against women North West Glasgow local delivery group.



Structure, governance and management

Central and West Integration Network was set up in September 2009 and was recognised as a Scottish charity with effect from 11 February 2011. The Charity is governed in accordance with the terms of the constitution.

Trustee recruitment and appointment

The Executive Committee members were appointed on inaugural General Meeting and at subsequent Annual General Meetings of the organisation.



Financial Review

Statement of the charity's policy on reserves

Central and West Integration Network is currently dependent on grants funding to sustain its activities, as earned income alone would not allow Central and West Integration Network to continue operating.

This means that if there were to be a gap in grants funding it is likely that Central and West Integration Network would have to close down.

To avoid closure if funding difficulties were to happen Central and West Integration Network Executive Committee has agreed to keep a certain level of financial reserves to ensure that

- Main operations can continue for a period of 3 months.
- Redundancy payments are made

The main concerns of the Executive Committee are to ensure:

- that members/service users are supported to move on to other services

Currently funding has been secured at different levels up until March 2019, but if difficulties were to arise then, it has been calculated that reserves of £16627.14 would be needed to continue running for at least 3 months and redundancy payment of £8,072. The calculations are included as an appendix to this policy.

The reserves should be built up from the unrestricted (earned) income.

The level of reserves should be calculated and monitored every 12 months by the Development Manager who will report back to the Executive Committee.

This policy should be reviewed yearly and whenever there are significant changes in staff hours, numbers or accrued years of service.

Report of the Independent Examiner to the Management Committee

I report on the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2018 on pages 13 - 18 which have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies for charities.

Respective responsibilities of the Management Committee and the Independent Examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) 2005 Act and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently, I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.
